Celebrating Diversity and New Beginnings

Last month saw our individual townships coming together to celebrate diversity and inclusion. I had the pleasure of attending and presenting at the IDAHOBIT event in Echuca, honouring the International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia, Interphobia and Transphobia. The stories that were told on the day highlighted a great spirit and pride amongst my fellow Campaspe Shire residents. Another great annual recognition which many Councillors and Council staff attended was the National Reconciliation Week ceremony. This year's theme was 'Be Brave, Make Change! A great theme which I encourage locals to carry with them every day of the year, not just during Reconciliation Week.

New beginnings and fresh starts were also evident during the last month. Several exciting project announcements were made, including a new early childhood community hub to be developed in Echuca West. We are proud to be partnering with

Sandhurst Catholic Early Childhood Education and Care to bring this development to life. The statutory process for transferring this land will start shortly. In time, this hub will relieve the strain from our existing kindergarten services as well as providing a location for our Maternal and Child health and children focused allied health services.

The community engagement process on our towns and our pools has also taken flight. I encourage all residents to gain an understanding of this process and how we are engaging with community members at all levels. There are many different steps to this process, so I would recommend you watch the informative video available on Council's website. You can read more on page 2.

And recently, Council adopted the budget the coming year. The \$84.70 million Budget has been developed in line with the Victorian Government's Fair Go Rates System with rate revenue capped at 1.75 per cent and supports a \$36.61 million capital works program. The 2022/23 Budget is now available on Council's website.

Community Engagement - Our Towns, Our Pools

How is the community engagement process going to work? There are several steps that engage our communities to build a better future for not just the outdoor pools, but all town assets.

Step 1 - Initial review

A Community Panel of 30 to 50 Campaspe Shire residents will be randomly chosen by an external consultant. The panel will complete an initial review on the outdoor pools. The panel will assess Council documentation and data, along with data from a Shire wide telephone survey. The panel will also hear from pool user groups. Once all the information has been reviewed, the panel will give its initial position on the future of the public pools to the Councillors.



Step 2 - Place Based Planning and Township Facility Planning

During this time, Place Based Plans and Township Facility Plans will also be created for each town. The towns with swimming pools are being prioritised.

These plans will be developed with the assistance of community committees. Locals nominated themselves to be members of these committees.

Place Based Plan Committees are made up of local people from different backgrounds, aligned to different community groups, with different skills and expertise. The Place Based Plan is a document that will showcase community aspirations, which will help to guide future planning. What do the residents want their town to be? Focused on agriculture, on art, on recreation? A haven for tourists, for families, for industries?

Township Facility Plan Committees are made up of local people with backgrounds in business, finance, construction, tourism, law, planning, real estate, recreation, and social wellbeing; people who can expertly evaluate and comment on a Township Facility Plan. The Township Facility Plans will assess all community assets and provide recommendations to Council about the future of these assets.

Both committees will then report the respective plans to the overarching 'Community Panel' for consideration.



Step 3 - Panel to review

The Community Panel will then review each town's Place Based Plan and Township Facility Plan. It will examine both documents to ensure they address issues such as social health and wellbeing, economic development and more. The panel will then decide whether to adopt the plans, note the plans or decline to support the plans.



Step 4 - Recommendation

Finally, the Community Panel will review all data and all community opinion – from the initial review, from all plans and from the telephone survey. They will then make a recommendation to Council on the future of outdoor public pools.

Explore the Port



The fantastic new audiovisual exhibits recite the story of the wharf while you stand back and admire the craftmanship of our early pioneers. It's an encompassing experience that pulls you back into the past. Hear the fascinating true stories of the people who lived before us, the pioneers of the Murray. Hear about their struggles, their triumphs and their way of life 150 years ago.

Take a guided tour, a private charter or even join the exciting 'Port After Dark' tour. Journey through the Star Bar's underground tunnel and discover the secrets left over from prohibition. And of course, there's nothing more scenic than cruising down the Murray on one of the original paddlesteamers. The Port of Echuca is open every day from 9am – 5pm (excluding Christmas Day).

PORT OF ECHUCA DISCOVERY CENTRE

The History: A Small Snippet

Built in 1865 by the Victorian Railways, the wharf is one of the reasons Echuca is the bustling town it is today. For decades, Echuca was the main shipbuilding centre for the river transport industry. At its peak, the Port of Echuca supported eight sawmills and turned over up to 240 paddlesteamers each year.

During this time, Echuca flourished. Pubs, breweries and businesses boomed as the town revelled in its success. Legend has it that it wasn't uncommon for horse races to stir up the dust down High Street where boutiques boasted the finest in European fashion and finery. Bare knuckle fights lasted hours down on the riverbanks and you could catch a Murray Cod as big as a man.

The centrepiece was the huge red gum wharf. Once Australia's largest inland Port at a staggering 1.2 kilometres long, it's home to the world's largest collection of paddlesteamers. Both PS Pevensey and PS Alexander Arbuthnot were restored in Echuca by shipwrights at the Port of Echuca.

PS Alexander Arbuthnot, or 'AA' as she's affectionately known, was named after the former owner of the Arbuthnot Sawmills at Koondrook – Alexander ('Squire') James Cooke Arbuthnot. The hull of 'AA' was built in Koondrook by shipwright Charles Felshaw and in 1916 she began life as a barge. It wasn't until 1923 she was commissioned and towed to Echuca for the fitting of engine, boiler and superstructure so she could start her new job as a working steamer.

PS Pevensey was named after a sheep station on the Murrumbidgee, 'Pevensey Station'. Back in her hey-day, the 'Pev' as she's known, carried 120 tonnes of cargo. She collected wool bales from stations and carried them into the Echuca wharf where they were then destined for Melbourne. The Pev could carry 815 bales of wool and a total of 2,000 bales when barges were towed along behind her.

Celebrating Our Volunteers

The month of May played host to 'National Volunteer Week', a time that recognises the power of volunteering right around Australia. Council was proud to participate in several celebratory events throughout the shire, acknowledging those people who give their time to building better communities. Council currently engages around 125 volunteers in all sorts of services – at the libraries, animal shelter, community transport and the Port of Echuca. Council would like to extend sincere appreciation to the wonderful volunteers who enhance these Council services.

Outside of Council, organisations such as the Campaspe Murray Vibrant Volunteers Network are the backbone of our community. Last month, the Network formally unveiled the 'My Volunteering Story' project, documenting the contributions of many volunteers in our region. Those featured included Rochester's Bob Knight, Kyabram's Barry and Anne Churches, Murray River Tea Room's Barbara Sands, Tongala's Murray Ross, Vision Australia's Margaret Russell, youngster Nate Schubach and coordinator of the Isobel Harvey exhibits Margaret Smerdon.

"The project is a small way of expressing our appreciation to those who have been profiled. We are also highlighting the different ways people become involved in volunteering, the motivation behind their interest and most importantly, the personal rewards it can bring," explains Volunteer Project Coordinator Alma Limbrick.

Hydrate!

Healthy Heart of Victoria has helped to install 'hydration stations' at the Rushworth Public Park Reserve and at the Colbinabbin Town Recreation Reserve. The GV Water Refill Stations provide locals with access to free, fresh water, as part of Healthy Heart's promotion of water over sugar sweetened beverages. These hydration stations will also support our local football, netball and tennis clubs.

The 2019 **Active Living** Census states that Tongala and district residents only consume on average 4.2 cups of water per day, around half of the recommended daily amount. Healthy Heart will be delivering water bottles to students



at Tongala Primary School and St Patricks Primary School Tongala. These schools were participants in the 'before school' exercise program, encouraging students to keep active. These drink bottles are the next step - encouraging the youngest members of the town to 'choose water'. Grade 5 and 6 students will also participate in a 'healthy lunch box' session and go on to develop an educational video to show the rest of the school. The video will also be shared with the local kindergarten and all future students.

Building in Campaspe

Council is responsible for implementing State Government planning and building regulations and Council policies.

Planning covers a broad range of issues but is essentially about the decision that changes the environment. A planning permit may be required for development projects, land uses, advertising signs and removing trees, depending on requirements under the Campaspe Planning Scheme.

A building permit will also be required for most development proposals including extensions to houses, new houses and sheds, and in some cases, fences and retaining walls. Even if a planning permit isn't necessary, a building permit may be. If you are using a builder, architect or draftsperson, they will often get the permit on your behalf.

Building Permit Guide

Do these common types of building work require a building permit?

Additions (extensions)

To a dwelling or any other building

Alterations

- Structural alterations to a dwelling or any other building
- New dwellings
- Removal of or alteration to a load bearing part of a building
- Remodelling a bathroom or kitchen, replacing internal walls cladding (like for like) that does not include structural alterations

Carports & garages

- ✓ Building a garage/carport larger than 10m2 in area
- ✗ Demolishing a freestanding garage/carport, not made of masonry, not more than 40m2 in floor area, is not a building on the Heritage Register and the work will not adversely affect public safety or those occupying the building

Decks/Veranda

Building a deck/veranda

Fences

- X Building a side fence up to 2m high
- ✓ Building a brick front fence more than 1.2m high
- Building a timber front fence less than 1.5m in height and not within 9m of a point of intersection of street alignments
- Building a fence that is more than 1m high, and not within 9m of a point of intersection of street alignments (corner block)
- ✗ Building a chain wire tennis court fence

Pergola

Not more than 3.6m in height, has a floor area of no more than 20m2, and is located no further forward than 2.5m from the front of the associated dwelling

Re-blocking

 Re-blocking, restumping or underpinning an existing building

Retaining walls

Constructed on or near site boundaries (any height) where there is a risk of damage of adjoining property

- Building a retaining wall 1m or more in height
- ✗ Building a retaining wall less than 1m not associated with any building work or with protection of adjoining property

Roofing

- Replacing corrugated iron roofing with concrete or terracotta roofing tiles
- Replacing concrete or terracotta roofing tiles with corrugated iron roofing (This can affect the wind up lift on the roof structure)
- Replacing corrugated iron roofing with similar corrugated iron sheeting ("Colourbond") and no replacement of structural battens
- Replacing corrugated iron roofing with another pre-finished metal sheeting which requires the installation of structural battens

Sheds associated with a single dwelling

- Building a freestanding shed, 10m2 or less in area, 3m less in height, setback 1m or more from the boundary and located no further forward than the front wall of the single dwelling
- Building a shed more than 10m2 in area

Swimming pools, spas

- Installing/constructing a swimming pool or spa greater than 300mm in depth
- Swimming pool/spa fencing *note Swimming Pools and Spas need to be registered with Council and owners are required to submit a Certificate of Barrier Compliance every 4 years

Windows

- Replacing windows with similar type windows, where no structural alterations are required
- Installing 'bay' or 'corner' type windows, where structural alterations are required

Wood heater

✗ Installing a wood heater (solid fuel burning appliances) *Ensure a licensed plumber is employed to do the installation
