Located in the west of the Campaspe Shire local government area (LGA), Lockington & District is an agricultural area that is home to a proactive and resilient community.

The Lockington & District Place Based Plan (the Plan) presents a shared vision for Lockington & District, which includes the townships of Bamawm, Bamawm Extension, Kotta, Lockington, Milloo, Pine Grove and Tennyson.

The Plan is a place based and community-led plan. It has been developed through a collaborative process with the Lockington & District community and Campaspe Shire Council.

The Plan:

- outlines Lockington & District's unique local character and identity
- identifies key strengths, challenges and opportunities
- articulates a shared vision for the future, and
- contains an action plan to guide collective effort, advocacy and investment.

The following page outlines the key steps taken to develop the Lockington & District Place Based Plan.





This section provides a summary of key Council documents relevant to the Lockington & District Place Based Plan.

The following Council strategies, plans and policies were reviewed as part of developing this plan:

- Open Space Strategy 2022-2032
- Campaspe Tomorrow
- Council Plan 2021-2025
- Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan, and
- Campaspe Economic Development and Tourism Strategy 2024-2020.

The review of these documents highlights the ability of the community to work with Council and others to deliver shared priorities and aspirations:

Strengthen social cohesion and connections

There is a focus on building social cohesion and connections through community events and other social opportunities. Council also wants to build the capacity of community organisations and groups and continue to promote community volunteering.

Improve health and wellbeing outcomes and access to services

There is a focus on improving the health and wellbeing outcomes for all residents living in Campaspe. This can be achieved by promoting active and healthy lifestyles, including ensuring there are appropriate and safe recreational activities and spaces for the community and addressing barriers community cohorts such as older people may face in accessing these spaces. The mental health of residents is also a focus area through running events such as for R U OK Day and working with young people through youth groups and schools.

It is recognised that access to services, regardless of where someone lives, is fundamental to supporting community and individual health and wellbeing. This includes access to health (including physical, mental and maternal), disability, Indigenous and family violence services.

Improve local facilities and infrastructure

Local facilities, including halls, recreation spaces, and essential infrastructure such as telecommunications, roads, footpaths, and public transport, should be well-maintained, accessible, and equipped to support liveability, growth and change.

Preserve township character

Campaspe Shire is known for its vibrant and charming townships that are home to resilient and friendly communities. It is important that these townships retain their unique character into the future.

Ensure there is a diverse range of sport and recreation facilities

It is important that there is access to a diverse range of high-quality sport and recreation facilities across the shire. This includes parks, open spaces, playgrounds, sporting grounds, walking trails and bike paths. Key recommendations from the Open Space Strategy relating to Lockington include removing the play equipment from Lucas Crescent and directing funds to Lions Park and acquiring the Crown section land at the Lockington Recreation Reserve.



Support local businesses and employment

Council and the community aspire for the shire to be home to a diverse and resilient economy where local businesses thrive. It's important that high-value industries such as agriculture, health and aged care, manufacturing and tourism are supported. Access to local employment, particularly for young people, is also important to help keep them in the area in the long-term.

Support tourism

There is the opportunity to promote Campaspe as a tourist destination, particularly for arts, agricultural, environmental and First Nations tourism. A key strategic principle of Council's Economic Development and Tourism Strategy is a focus on localised and place-based opportunities for tourism. Relevant projects include the development of walking trails across the region and agritourism development through paddock to plate programs.



It is important to protect the natural environment, including the waterways, for the future.



The Lockington & District community has also developed a number of strategic documents to drive improvements in the area, including:



The District is a prime agricultural area, featuring an extensive irrigation network. This has led to the growth of dairying and orcharding, as well as several beef farms in the area. Other local businesses include the general store, post office, the Lockington Hotel and the Lockington & District Business Centre which houses a petrol station, op shop, library, community bank and neighbourhood house. There is also a popular Traveller's Rest located in the centre of town which provides powered and unpowered sites to tourists.

Housing in Lockington predominantly consists of low density, separate houses. These homes are spread out across the rural landscapes of the District, with larger properties and farms typically located in the outer areas. Lockington & District is also home to Water Wheel Court, a 16-unit accommodation development for aged or disabled residents.

The Lockington town centre, with its rural charm, is home to various heritage buildings and sites. The Lockington & District

Living Heritage Complex is a community-owned and volunteer-run local history museum that shares the

heritage of the area. It includes exhibitions such as a shearing shed, a dairy shed, a Masonic lodge, a restored tram and Australia's first pop-top caravan. The Complex is an important tourist destination for the area. Other key tourism strengths of the area include nature-based activities, water sports and fishing. According to the Economic Development & Tourism Strategy 2024-2029, the Lockington-Gunbower area receives around 40,000 visitors per year, with the majority (57%) visiting for a holiday.

Important social infrastructure includes the Lockington Consolidated School, a number of local halls including Kotta Hall, Milloo Hall and Lockington Community Centre, local parks and sporting facilities

such as Lockington Recreation Reserve, Bamawm
Recreation Reserve, Tennyson Recreation Reserve, Pine
Grove Recreation Reserve and Lockington Swimming Pool and the
Lockington & District Bush Nursing Centre. The town is also home to
the Vintage Tractor and Stationary Engine Rally hosted every ANZAC
day weekend, alongside other events including a country music festival,
luncheons and recreational activities such as lawn bowls.

The Lockington & District community is resilient, proactive and welcoming, and work together to make the area a great place to live. Together the community established the Lockington & District Business Centre which is a hub for locals to buy fuel, access banking and library services, access wifi, print, do laundry and participate in community events and programs. More recently, the community purchased the Lockington Hotel, a well-loved pub that attracts customers from across Campaspe Shire.





Our success stories

Lockington & District Business Centre

Established in 2003, the Lockington & District Business Centre is a community-owned, not-for-profit business that aims to provide high quality business, community and educational services to Lockington and District.

At the Centre community members can buy fuel, print and access wifi, bank, visit the library and op shop, do laundry and access services via the neighbourhood house. The Centre also runs a range of community events and programs including a Men's Shed, Youth Action Group and a community garden. In 2021 the Business Centre also developed the Lockington Pumptrack for children and young people to ride bikes, scooters and skateboards.



Over recent years the Lockington Community Care Committee has established Water Wheel Court, a 16-unit accommodation development for aged or disabled residents.

This project started with a community grant and has expanded over the years. This affordable housing model supports local residents to age in place with their established community connections.

Lockington-Kotta Rail Trail

The Lockington Kotta Rail Trail Committee have been working hard to get approvals and funding to develop an 8km rail trail along the old train lines between Lockington and Kotta. This will provide cyclists, walkers, runners and horse riders with a safe and shady route to travel between the two towns.

Recently the former Kotta Station was relocated from the Port of Echuca to its original location on the Kotta Railway. This forms an important landmark of the rail trail.



Our success stories

Lockington Hotel

The Lockington Hotel serves as a vibrant community hub where locals and visitors from across Campaspe Shire come to socialise, enjoy great food and experience warm hospitality. In 2019, the Hotel faced the threat of closure. Rather than losing this beloved establishment, the community banded together to purchase the Lockington Hotel as a communityowned business. Since then, it has thrived, demonstrating the power of collective action.

Community Bank

For over 20 years, Community Bank Elmore,
Lockington and Rochester has existed to feed
into community prosperity and help the area
thrive. The locally owned and operated bank
provides more than just a banking service – it has
contributed over \$3.2million to the community via
sponsorships, grants, youth scholarships and dividends
to local shareholders. The Community Bank strengthens the
local community by providing job opportunities and resources
to improve their financial literacy. The Community Bank is proud
to give a voice to the region by encouraging other funders to cosupport projects in local communities.

All ability cricket at Bamawm Recreation Reserve

Since 2021, Bamawm Lockington United Cricket Club has run the only all-ability cricket program in the shire at Bamawm Recreation Reserve.

Open to participants of all ages, the program sees a high number of people with disability supported by the NDIS take part. The program offers opportunities to play cricket, develop skills and socialise in an inclusive and supportive environment.

In the most recent program, 45 people from across Campaspe Shire participated.



3.1 Our Community

All data in this section is sourced from the 2021 Australia Bureau of Statistics Census, and covers the following suburbs: Bamawm, Bamawm Extension, Kotta, Lockington, Milloo, Pine Grove and Tennyson.

Lockington & District is home to a younger population compared to Campaspe Shire. The community is typically made up of families with children born in Australia and living in separate houses they own either outright or via mortgage.

Looking ahead the population of Lockington & District is forecast to remain relatively stable, with modest but steady growth.

3.2 Our Strengths

The following outlines the strengths of Lockington & District as described by local community.

A self-reliant and proactive community

We are self-reliant, proactive and often work together to make improvements to the area. Some of our key successes include the Lockington & District Business Centre, the Lockington Hotel and the development of the rail trail between Lockington and Kotta.

Our community is also known for being welcoming, friendly and helpful. Whether its volunteering at a local sports club or community group or socialising at the local pub, our people are there for each other.

"The sense of community within Lockington & District is outstanding with a community that bands together when times get tough."

"No isn't a word in the dictionary in Lockington."

A wide range of community groups

We have a number of community groups that not only offer spaces for the community to meet and socialise, but also provide leadership in applying for grants and collaborating on town improvements. This includes Landcare, Lockington Channel Committee, Lockington Lions Club, Lockington Action Club, the Country Women's Association and many more.


"There are so many voluntary groups who make the town what it is. This includes emergency services, tourism, history/heritage and sporting clubs."

Recreation facilities and strong sporting culture

Our recreation facilities and groups are the heartbeat of our community. They provide spaces for children and adults alike to participate in sport and recreation, socialise, stay healthy and connect with each other. There are a range of sporting opportunities available, including football, netball, basketball, lawn bowls, swimming, golf, equestrian, cricket, tennis – with great facilities and active clubs.

"The Lockington Recreation Reserve is a well-loved part of the community.

There is always someone using the reserve, including Des who is 90 or kids kicking a ball. It's a really well used space. These facilities create community pride and foster social engagement."



Local businesses and services

We have access to a range of local businesses that meet our needs and provide spaces for us to socialise and gather. This includes the Lockington Hotel and the Business Centre alongside the supermarket, the Traveller's Rest, the post office and the Community Bank.

We also have a range of services that are critical in maintaining the health and wellbeing of our community. The Lockington & District Bush Nursing Centre is a primary health centre that is highly valued and valuable to our town. Our local school, the Lockington Consolidated School, supports existing, and helps to attract new, families to the area and offers before and after school care. The Lockington Kindergarten provides a safe space for children to learn.

"The pub, post office, bush nurses, school and supermarket are the life blood of our village.

The free camp/caravan sites are brilliant for bringing people to our village and adding to the economy."

A diverse range of events

We have many events in our area. This includes larger scale events such as the Tractor Rally and swap meets through to smaller community events such as Christmas carols in the park, bowls, the monthly cuppa and connect at the Plumbers Shed and events at the Bush Nursing Centre. Lockington also runs a number of campdraft events, showcasing the community's strong agricultural

traditions and horsemanship skills.

Access to natural environment and walking trails

We love the natural environment surrounding Lockington & District, including the walking trails, waterway and flora and fauna.

"I love the natural feel. There are plenty of eucalyptus trees and birds such as kookaburras, frogmouths, galahs, corellas rosellas and magpies. It's amazing."



3.3 Our Challenges

The following outlines some challenges for Lockington & District as described by local community.

Pedestrian safety and quality of footpaths

Many of our footpaths and roads are in need of improvement for pedestrian and cyclist use. Key concerns are around speeding cars and a lack of, or poorly maintained footpaths. The changing and confusing speed limits along Lockington Road puts pedestrians, including children walking to and from school, at risk. There are also a number of unsealed roads with potholes that can make driving dangerous.

Lack of appropriate amenities at local parks, playgrounds and sporting facilities

While we have many great recreation and sporting facilities, some of these spaces lack the appropriate amenities. This includes accessible bathrooms and showers, shade and seating. On top of this, our recreation facilities such as Lockington Recreation Reserve and Bamawm Recreation Reserve do not have

Access to health services

While the Lockington & District Bush Nursing Centre is an important health service in the area, it can be hard to access a GP or mental health services. The Bush Nursing Centre also relies on State Government funding which has not increased in recent years, despite the centres growing demand.

Ageing population and attracting young volunteers

Our population is ageing. This means as the community volunteers continue to grow older, there is a gap in the number of volunteers, which impacts the efficacy of some community groups. At the same time, young people are leaving the area as there are not enough education, employment or affordable housing opportunities for them. This means attracting new volunteers, particularly young volunteers is a key challenge going forward.

Sustainability of new local businesses

It can be hard for new businesses to open in Lockington & District and remain sustainable and profitable.





A range of community engagement activities were undertaken between July and August 2024. They are described in the table below, along with their estimated participant numbers. These activities were largely promoted, led and facilitated by representatives of the Place Based Plan Committee and Campaspe Shire Council, with support from the consultants at Cred Consulting.

Key Messages

People's top priorities for Lockington & District are:

- Improve pedestrian and cyclist experience and safety.
- Improve the quality of recreation and sporting facilities.
- Explore opportunities to host farmer's markets and other local events in Lockington & District.
- Improve access to services through outreach programs, and ensure current services are supported to remain in operation.
- Provide more support for community groups and encourage more people, particularly young people to get involved.
- Improve the look and feel of the Lockington town centre through more public art, more greenery including native plantings and more seating.
- Encourage new businesses to open in Lockington and support them and existing businesses to stay open.
- Explore opportunities to increase housing supply in Lockington & District, particularly affordable housing for older people and young families.
- Improve safety.

"A path around the channel would encourage people to walk around town and connect the two main areas together."

This section presents an action plan to improve the quality of life, wellbeing and resilience of the Lockington & District community.

The delivery of this action plan will require effort and collaboration from a range of different groups and stakeholders – including local residents, community groups, businesses, service providers and Campaspe Shire Council, as well as State and Federal Government.

Action Themes

To achieve the vision for Lockington & District, six different themes with supporting actions have been developed. This reflects the input and feedback received from consultation with the local community and stakeholders.

Recreation and wellbeing

Improving community health and wellbeing by providing a range of recreation opportunities and providing access to quality community and recreation spaces and facilities.

Look and feel

Continuing to enhance the character of Lockington & District, including through plantings, public art and signage.

Getting around and safety

Improving the pedestrian, cyclist and driver experience and making Lockington & District safer for everyone.

Environment

Protecting and enhancing the natural environment.

Business and tourism

Supporting local businesses and tourism in Lockington & District.

Things to do

Ensuring there are a variety of accessible and welcoming events and programs in Lockington & District.

Priority

The actions have been assigned the following levels of priority for their delivery:

- Short: Includes actions to be undertaken over the short term (next 18 months). It also relates to very important projects that require sustained effort and investment to achieve.
- Medium: Includes actions to be undertaken over the next 2-4 years
- Long: Includes actions to be undertaken over the next 4+ years
- Ongoing: Includes actions that are currently being undertaken, or will continue throughout the life of this plan.

6.1 Recreation and wellbeing

Our recreation spaces and facilities are the heartbeat of Lockington & District. This includes sporting facilities such as the recreation reserves that are the home to our sporting clubs, the Lockington Swimming Pool, to community facilities like the walking trails and local parks and playgrounds. We value our facilities and services that keep us healthy and socially connected, particularly the Lockington & District Bush Nursing Centre, Lockington & District Business Centre, Plumbers Shed and our various community halls and venues like the Lockington Community Centre and Milloo and Kotta Halls.

The actions under this theme focus on how we can improve our existing spaces and facilities and support continued access to the services that support community health, wellbeing and resilience.

6.2 Look and feel

Lockington & District is clean, beautiful and well-maintained. Our local community groups and volunteers work hard to look after local spaces and places. We also have a lot of greenery and trees, and some public art installations which help to reflect the unique character and history of our area.

6.3 Getting around and safety

Our community highly values the walking path along the channel and the other trails in the district. However, getting around can be difficult and unsafe for pedestrians, cyclists and drivers. Our key concerns include speeding cars, the need for new or upgraded footpaths, unsealed roads and poor street lighting.

6.5 Business and tourism

Lockington & District has a range of local businesses that meet our daily needs, provide spaces for our community to socialise and gather and attract visitors to the area. However, sometimes our local businesses struggle to remain sustainable and profitable, and there is often not enough support. This can impact both the local economy and tourism. There is also not enough housing supply in Lockington & District, particularly for older people, young people and families.
